#### **Social Connections**

Children and adults with an extensive network of family, friends and neighbors have better support in times of need.

#### **Concrete Support**

Access to financial, housing, food and other concrete resources helps children and adults meet their basic needs.

#### Knowledge, Skills and Virtues

Children and adults discover the things that are most important to them in life and develop the knowledge, skills and virtues they need to succeed at those things.

#### Resilience

Children and adults learn to solve problems, get along with others, and overcome adversity.

### **Social and Emotional Competence of Others**

Children and adults with the ability to effectively communicate and manage their emotions help others learn to get their needs met and get along with others.

## Neighborhood Events and Engagement

Community Cafés are guided conversations based on the Strengthening Families Protective Factors™ Framework leadership development and parent partnership. Each FHI Neighborhood hosts a weekly, bi-monthly or monthly Community Café. The Protective Factors are the foundation that ensure neighborhoods are safe, nurturing, healthy places to raise a family.

Protective Factors Events are activities designed to address identified needs within your neighborhood. Events have included but are not limited to community health fairs, vaccination clinics, coat/clothing distribution, educational workshops, community gardens and exercise groups. Events will vary and are designed to address one or more of the following: building social connections, increasing knowledge, skills and virtues and resiliency, providing tangible supports and building social and emotional competence.
