

Kristen's Triumph Over Adversity

After giving birth to Olivia, Kristen had no place to live. She arrived at St. Joseph Family Shelter with her two-day-old baby, feeling broken and unwilling to return to the abusive relationship she had removed herself from. She felt heartbroken, scared, and as if everything was falling apart. Eventually, she opened up to the staff at St. Joseph Family Shelter and, with their support and encouragement, she began to feel safe again. The Shelter staff helped Kristen find a job and within ten months, she was approved to move into her own apartment.

It has been a year since Kristen left St. Joseph Family Shelter and moved into her own place. "Life is much less stressful and happier. I have a job that I am good at and worked my way to supervisor in just two months. I am now trying to set up CNA training. This should help me find a career with room to grow so I could earn sufficient money working a little less than full-time and have more time with my daughter. I am feeling more determined and less defeated!"

Kristen shared what it meant to be at St. Joseph Family Shelter during that terrifying time in her life. "It gave me a safe, secure place to raise and take care of my daughter for the first year of her life. I was able to communicate with caring staff and learn how to make better life choices and personal choices." She reflected on what life would've been like if she hadn't been connected with St. Joseph Family Shelter, "I would most likely not have custody of my daughter. I wouldn't be where I am with my living situation or job, and I would be a broken human being. St. Joseph Family Shelter gave us our lives."

TLC at St. Joseph Family Shelter to Help Families in Crisis

In order to help more families facing extreme adversity to stay together, over the past several months, CCS has worked in partnership with the Department of Human Services and several community partners to develop and launch a new program at St. Joseph Family Shelter. The Transitional Living Community (TLC) at St. Joseph is now located in Marmion Hall and represents a change in the screening and referral process for families housed on the St. Joseph campus. The program will now have a special focus on families who need support and stable housing in order to protect and nurture their children. "Without safe, stable housing, these families would be at imminent risk of losing their children to foster care," said CCS Executive Director Jim Seymour. "This can create a cycle of poverty and homelessness that is difficult to break."

Families will receive many additional supports, such as counseling and childcare, to ensure that they can transition back into the community into safe, long-term housing and progress toward financial self-sufficiency. DHS will contribute to the annual cost of providing housing to families in crisis, and with the continued support of the community, the St. Joseph Family Shelter campus and all of the programs and ministries offered there will become more financially sustainable over time.



Together with the Benedictine Sisters, St. Mary Parish, Mt. Angel Abbey, Exchange Club and other community partners, CCS has been working to bring new resources to the St. Joseph Family Shelter campus to ensure the programs there will thrive and serve families in need for years to come. Two changes to program operations are the Transitional Living Community and the Exchange Club Parent Aide Volunteer Program. The Transitional Living Community at St. Joseph is a multi-faceted partnership that brings together various resources on behalf of families in crisis (see pg. 1). The Exchange Club Parent Aide Volunteer Program is also a new aspect of programming on campus and is seeking community volunteers who want to make a difference in the lives of families served.

Parent Aide Volunteers Needed

Do you have or want experience supporting children and families in difficult circumstances? Please consider becoming a Parent Aide Volunteer. The Exchange Club Parent Aide Volunteer Program is a volun-

tary program for families served at the St. Joseph Family Shelter campus. Often, parents feel overwhelmed and need support to develop the skills necessary to provide a healthy, happy, and safe home.

Parent Aide Volunteers develop a supportive relationship with families to build effective parenting, problem-solving, coping, and communication skills. By engaging the family in fun recreational activities, helping with homework time, sharing resources, or lending an ear, Parent Aide Volunteers help strengthen the parent-child relationship, build parenting skills, improve communication, reduce stress, increase child safety, and more.

- 3. Consider moving Mission Benedict from the basement.
- 4. Continue exploring the best use of the Marmion Hall building.
