About St. Joseph, Casa Adele and Mission Benedict

The Benedictine Sisters of Mt. Angel established St. Joseph Shelter in 1988. The Shelter was established as a ministry of hospitality in response to the Gospel message of caring for those in need and honoring St. Benedict's instruction to welcome all as Christ. The Shelter, Mission Benedict and Casa Adele witness to the dignity of each person by providing meals, housing, clothing, advocacy, referrals, emergency assistance and a supportive community. Following 30 years of loving care and service to homeless families and individuals in the Mt. Angel community, the Benedictine Sisters realized they could no longer sustain this vital ministry on their own. The Sisters called on CCS to assume responsibility for operation of the Shelter, and CCS called on its long-time partner the Exchange Club to help sustain and grow the impact of volunteer support for the Shelter and the families served there. The combined programs are now a collaborative endeavor, sustained by CCS, the Benedictine Sisters of Mt. Angel, St. Mary Parish, Mt. Angel Abbey, the Department of Human Services' Strengthening, Preserving and Reunifying Families Program, the Exchange Club and many generous donors and volunteers.




About the Program

Parent aides offer accompaniment and positive relationships to families in need of extra support. This program aims to provide volunteer-based support systems for our families seeking healthy relationships while working to stabilize their own housing, employment and family dynamics. Parent Aides offer weekly communication, outings for the parents and/or children, accompaniment, and other forms of support that seem important in the development of this relationship.
