Prior to finding refuge at the St. Joseph Family Shelter, Heidi and her daughters lived in constant fear due to her husband's verbal and physical abuse. However, the birth of her youngest daughter, Daphne, gave her the strength and courage to seek help.

"I needed help to leave," said Heidi. "I found the courage and the strength to leave my husband." With assistance from a dedicated case worker and staff from St. Joseph Family Shelter, Heidi found safety and developed confidence in her ability to be a good parent. She reflects on her life before finding peace at the shelter, "If one good thing came out of the last twelve years of my life, it's my three girls." Heidi now lives in her own home with her three daughters.
